Cancellation of 10-11 August Working Bee:

A group requested that weekend at Lions Camp Duckadang, so Manager Belinda arranged this after consulting Management Committee. The Board has a policy that forgoes a working bee weekend if a group requests that weekend.

Caravan Park area open at Lions Camp Duckadang:

We were successful in gaining a grant from the Qld Government Community Benefit Fund.

The grant of \$34 808.49 was for the completion of the caravan park on the top level, and the provision of an extra 9 bunk beds and 18 innerspring mattresses.

These beds are full compliant with safety requirements, and have upper and lower rails as well as a strong ladder to reach the top bunk.

There is also greater space between the upper and lower bunks.

The specifications of the new bunk beds should please people of all ages.

The photo shows one of the four pillars set up on the top level at the Camp to provide electricity and water for up to eight caravans.

The pillars have a light on the top to make best placement of a caravan an easy task.

LIONS MEDICAL RESEARCH FOUNDATION

DR OLIVIA HOLLAND IS THE 2019 RECIPIENT OF THE LIONS MEDICAL RESEARCH FOUNDATION FELLOWSHIP

To align with the pillars of Lions Clubs International, a diabetes researcher was sought for this prestigious scholarship and the Foundation is pleased to announce the appointment of Dr Olivia Holland as the most recent recipient of a Lions Medical Research Foundation Fellowship. Dr Holland is a research fellow based at the Institute of Health and Biomedical Innovation, Queensland University of Technology, and the School of Medical Science, Griffith University. She completed her PhD at the University of Auckland and worked as a research fellow at the Faculty of Medical and Health Sciences, the University of Auckland, before moving to Queensland in 2014.

As a researcher, Dr Holland is focused on improving pregnancy health, and understanding how events during pregnancy can impact the ongoing health of mother and child. Dr Holland has a particular interest in diabetes during pregnancy, and in the underlying mechanisms that link placental dysfunction to pregnancy complications and the later development of conditions such as obesity and type 2 diabetes in adulthood. Dr Holland also investigates maternal nutrition, and how diet modifications and antioxidant treatment could be used to improve outcomes both during pregnancy and beyond.

Dr Holland has published widely in reproductive research, presented at many national and international scientific conferences, and received numerous awards and funding for her work.

Diabetes during pregnancy is a major Australian and global health problem, the incidence of which is rapidly escalating. With the support of the Lions Medical Research Foundation, Dr Holland will be working to determine the relationship between placental mitochondrial function and diabetes during pregnancy, and how we might better treat this increasingly critical health issue.

LIONS OPERATION FRIENDSHIP

Lions Exchange Overseas.

Operation Friendship has been a project of our district for a number of years. Lions from Australia have hosted visitors from Scandinavia, UK and Singapore, while Lions from Australia have reciprocated to provide fellowship and the experience of Lionism within another culture. In the words from the Lions Clubs International Purposes, what better way is there to:

... unite the clubs in the bonds of friendship, good fellowship and mutual understanding.

... create and foster a spirit of understanding among the people of the world.

When I receive invitations from our overseas Lions Districts, I will notify all clubs in our District, so that those wanting to make an application to go overseas can do so. It is a wonderful opportunity to experience another country, their Lions Clubs and their culture. These invitations are usually received in the second half of the year and the time of travel is about April the following year and generally for four to five weeks.

The applications work on 'first in first served' so if you are interested in an exchange please let me know early so you will not be disappointed. If you are planning to travel in a few years time, please let me know so that I may add you to a waiting list. If you have an overseas Lions District that you would like to visit, let me know and I maybe able to organise an exchange with that District. We generally only send two couples each year as we can only accept two couples here each year. The host district that has sent out the invitations makes the final acceptance of an application.

From the applications received, one Lion and their partner may be selected from our Lions District to spend one month as guests. Other applications will be held on file for future years.

The visitors are expected to attend and address a number of Lions Clubs and the District Convention during their visit.

During the visit, Lions host families will provide food and accommodation in the host families' homes as well as some sightseeing activities. Other costs such as restaurant meals, entry fees to attractions etc are by mutual arrangement. An itinerary will be planned so that visitors are accommodated in parts of the District that have different environments and lifestyles.

Visitors must arrange and pay for all travel costs and arrange appropriate travel and health insurance from Australia and return.

Lions Host Families

We are always in need Host Families for our visiting Lions. This is also a great opportunity for members to share Lionism and get to know our visitors as a host family or club, so please let me know if you would like to host a couple in your home during October November.

In planning the Host Family schedule we try to have the visitors see all parts of the District 201Q1. Coastal Areas, Mid West, Tablelands, Far West, Brisbane and Environs.

Hostings are usually about six days, with a changeover day at the end of each period.

Host Families need to provide accommodation, food in the family home and activities in their respective areas. The visitors are responsible for their own private expenditures, and medical and hospital costs.

Other costs such as restaurant meals, entry fees to attractions etc are by mutual arrangement. Usually the visitors are prepared to pay their own way if asked. **Ask your club to accept Operation Friendship as a Club Project. The Hosting is meant to be a Club Project.** The visitors may eat and sleep at one home but other club members should be involved by taking them out for a day or to some particular attraction.

Where possible the visitors should be taken as a guest speaker or observer to your Lions Club, or nearby Lions Clubs, meetings and projects. Where other community events occur, such as festivals and special days, the visitors may become involved and be recognised as visiting Lions. The visitors should be allowed to enjoy staying in a typical Australian family home and experience the routine things that happen. Australian food, shopping, traditions etc.

You will find that the visitors are keen to learn about Australia – geography, history, customs etc as well as speaking about life in their own country, including Lions activities. This allows for pleasant, social conversation in the family home.

SOME THOUGHTS ON MEMBERSHIP RETENTION

How to keep members happy and coming back

Club Culture

A Lions club is the sum of its members. As membership changes, clubs must adjust. The goal is to get your new members involved and keep your current members excited about your club.

The most commonly cited issues with club culture relate to feeling out of touch, or not part of the group.

- Club felt too political.
- Club felt too old-fashioned and stodgy.
- The leadership in my club changed and I did not like the change.
- Clubs are too hierarchal and formal.
- I did not enjoy the Lions customs.
- There were not enough opportunities for us to socialize.
- I had been with the club for a while and started to feel unappreciated.
- I did not feel like I belonged.

Think about whether your club is comfortable for your members.

- Tailor your club's practices to your members – do your current practices help or stifle your club?
- What traditions, customs and club rules support your club's vision of itself? Are the others helpful, or do they get in the way?
- Do your club's activities reflect the club goals/objectives/mission? If a non-member looked at your club activities, what would your club's purpose appear to be? Is that in line with your club's vision of itself and your members' expectations?

Make every member feel that they contribute to your club, and that their contribution is important.

- Respond when members make suggestions or offer input. Always follow up.
- Create opportunities for all members to get as involved as they want to be.
- Encourage new members to explore multiple opportunities within the club. Let them start where they are most excited to be, but be clear that committee participation rotates as part of leadership development.
- Use LCI resources such as Member Orientation to help your club make new members feel welcome and Club Officer Orientation get new officers oriented.
- Encourage use of the Mentoring Program and assign Lion mentors within the club in addition to the new member's sponsor. This provides two points of contact in the club for the new Lion.

Be open to suggestions and adjustments suggested by all of your members.

- Use your club's existing service projects as a source of ideas and guidance on what has worked or not worked well for your club BUT not as a list of "what we must do".
- Make a practice of retaining a review of your club activities as well as the plans. Be open to your members' evaluations of existing ideas and any new ideas for improvement.
- Hold joint meetings and joint service projects with nearby Lions clubs. This can generate new ideas and new perspectives.

Encourage each club member to invite community members to join your club whenever they meet someone who might enjoy being a Lion.

LCI has many resources for leadership training: Emerging Lions Leadership Institutes, webinars and online courses through the Lions Learning Center are available for ongoing leadership development for individual Lions.

Thousands raised for drought relief



HUNDREDS of residents, businesspeople and volunteers rallied together to raise funds and show support to farmers across the region at a lively fundraiser on Saturday.

About 200 people attended A Night Out for Drought, which was organised by the Lions Club of Warwick and held at the Warwick RSL Memorial Club.

The brains behind the event, Lions member Clare Jeffries, said more than \$3000 was raised through a great evening, which featured trivia, live music and a cent sale.

The money raised from the evening will go to local drought relief efforts.

Having grown up on a farm and with two brothers who work on the land, Mrs Jeffries said she understood what it was like to live through drought.

"The farmers are such proud people," Mrs Jeffries said.

"I said to my brother 'it's a drop in the ocean', but he said it's the fact that the farmers know people are doing things like that to help them."

While the region has enjoyed a little bit of rain in recent weeks, Mrs Jeffries said

the drought was not over.

"I think people will have a little bit of feed for now and the money we raise isn't going to buy much feed for many farmers, I think we'll be able to give that to them to buy food and with Easter coming up they can buy Easter eggs for the kids," she said.

Mrs Jeffries said the plan to distribute the money would be discussed at an upcoming Lions meeting, but she would like to see it used to buy food and meat vouchers that could be used at the businesses who had shown support for the evening.

She was very thankful for the support of local businesses.

"The businesses are definitely feeling it too, after all the farmers are the backbone our country."
