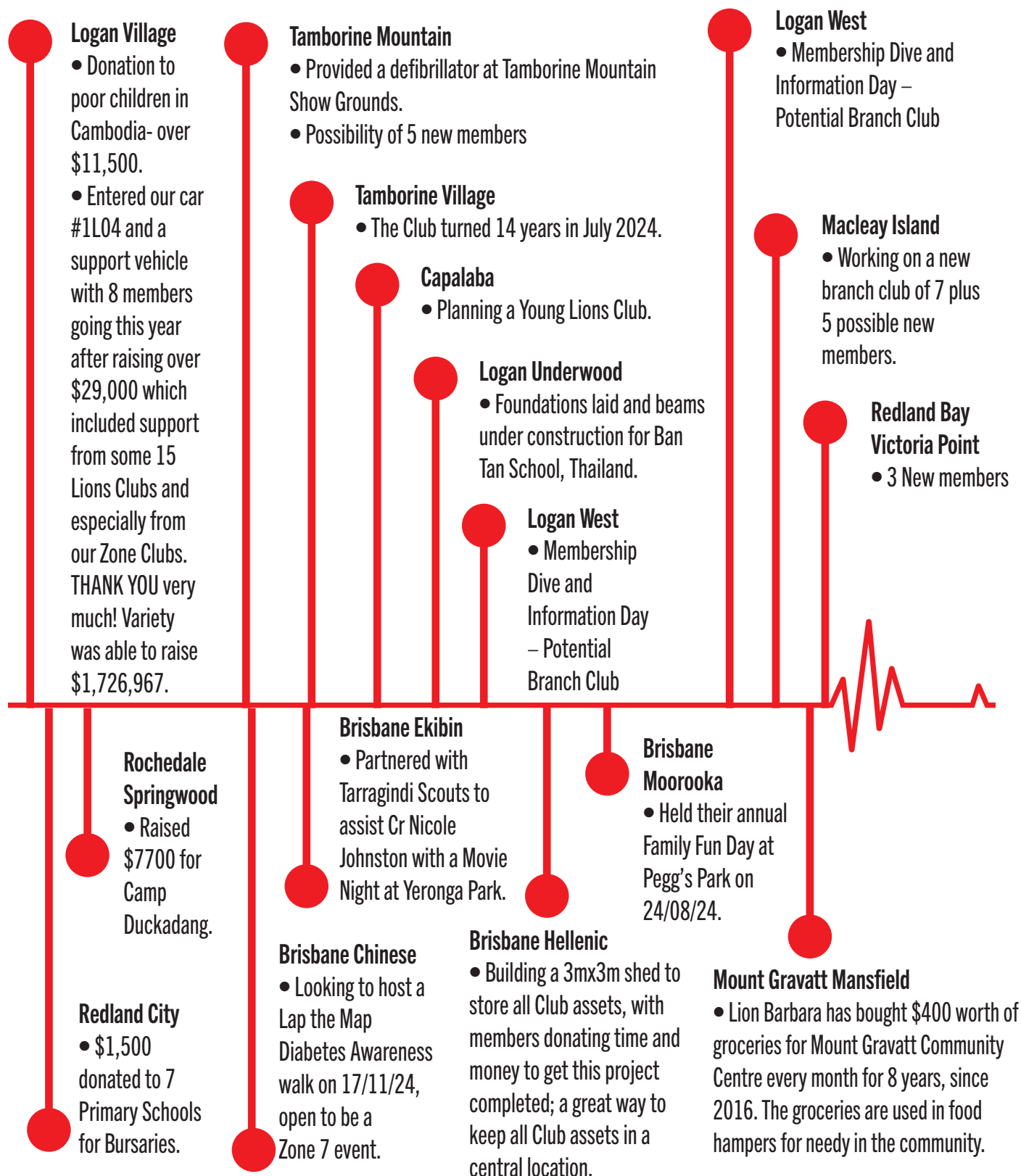
Enjoying the journey

Gaining Publicity



Lions Cakes & Puddings Can Create Extra Publicity & Sales

Does your club have an Official Opening when you commence your sales of Lions Cakes and Puddings? If the answer is 'no' perhaps you could consider having one with a view to establishing extra publicity and therefore a likely increase in sales.

A few suggestions for you to consider in creating a newsworthy **opening event**:

The official opening event will likely vary from market to market. Sometimes it will make sense to have a single club launch, while in other areas the favourable option would likely be for local clubs to combine. A few examples based in Regions 1 & 2.

(a) Region 1: Lismore clubs combine, Ballina Clubs & maybe Lennox Head do likewise, Casino by itself and likewise Kyogle, Bangalow, Bonalbo Upper

Clarence, Brunswick Mullumbimby, Murwillumbah, Cabarita Beach & Pottsville Beach, Kingscliff, and Coolangatta Tweed Heads. It is of course not mandatory for those shown as individual opportunities to do so if neighbouring clubs wish to join, they should do so.

(b) Region 2: Presents a greater opportunity for clubs to join. Clubs at the Southern end of the Gold Coast may consider Robina Shopping Centre, while clubs centrally on the Gold Coast could combine for an official opening at Pacific Fair, with the northern clubs combining at a major shopping centre there. There is also the option to consider the entire Gold Coast as the one market involving all Gold Coast clubs.

The First Step Components

(a) Determine if you'll stage this event just for your club or if in conjunction with one or more additional clubs.

Gaining Publicity

(b) Select your venue – if possible, in an area where there'll be an audience of shoppers.

(c) Determine if you will nominate a beneficiary of the products you sell in the lead up to Christmas 2024. You could nominate one or more beneficiaries.

The Second Step Components

(a) Determine who you'll ask to open your sales season. Will it be your Mayor, a Ward or Division Councillor, a State or Federal MP or someone else.

(b) Ask the person selected to use their available communication channels, (local media, newsletters, websites, social media etc) to publicise the Official Opening.

(c) Also use the communication channels available to each Lions Club to further promote the Official Opening.

(d) Ask the beneficiary/s to also promote through their communication channels.

(e) Invite local media to attend.

The Third Step Components

(a) Build a display of cakes and/or puddings and then wrap a red and or green ribbon/s around them which finishes in a bow. Probably best for the display to be on a table rather than the floor.

(b) A variation could be covering the display with a cloth, preferably displaying Christmas colours or a Christmas scene.

(c) Your guest simply cuts the ribbon/s or unveils the display by removing the cloth.

(d) If you've chosen a beneficiary donate the products to them and ensure you invite

representatives of the beneficiary to be present at the Official Opening and after the opening, ask them to speak.

(e) Provide a morning/afternoon tea/coffee and provide fruit cake slices or make the slices from whole cakes.

The fourth step components

Endeavour to maximise after the event publicity through the communication channels of:

(a) Local media

(b) Your Lions Club

(c) Your beneficiary/s

(d) The person who performed the official opening

Other matters you could consider

(a) Set a goal for the number of cakes and puddings you wish to sell and through until Christmas have signage like a thermometer which displays the progress daily. Would suggest this option is only used in secured areas, such as shopping centres, otherwise the thermometer could be vandalised.

(b) If you have a school as a beneficiary, you could have the official opening performed by the school principal on assembly of the school. If involving a school, perhaps you could share the profit between the school and your club. Most schools will email their school families promoting cake and pudding orders. Should you wish to do so, you could ask every school in your area to participate with the principal at each school launching the campaign. An alternate would be the President of the school's P & C. Clubs would not be obliged to make the school/s a beneficiary of other sales external of schools.

How to get Schools involved -

When approaching the schools, you need to be confident, you need to be prepared and you

absolutely need to know about Youth of the Year to sell Youth of the Year.

Find your "champion" (a teacher) in the school and request to meet with them face to face (meet at a time suitable to them), to share about this great program and show them the many benefits of their students participating.

***The rewards for the contestants are endless...
Contestants can:***

- enhance prospects for entering tertiary education and gaining employment?
- develop new friendships and networking opportunities with other like-minded students?
- optimise leadership and citizenship qualities and play a constructive role in the community?
- gain experience in presenting themselves to prospective employers and speaking in a public forum?

In addition to prizes awarded and recognition given to contestants at Club, Zone and District Finals, each State Winner will:

- receive \$1,500 at the National Final, where he/she and one parent/guardian will be guests of Lions

Australia for four nights, including travel & accommodation.



- The National Winner receives \$5,000 payable on his/her 18th birthday.
- The National Public Speaking Winner receives \$2,500 payable on their 18th birthday.
- In the event that the National Winner is also the Public Speaking Winner, then only one prize of \$5,000, as described above, will be awarded.
- Each school sponsoring a State Winner is eligible to receive \$1,000 towards a youth related project.

YOTY contestants are rewarded with new friendships, networking opportunities, honed interview skills and a great sense of accomplishment in delivering a public speech.

YOTY participation is highly regarded by many employers and tertiary institutions. Some may even recognise co-curricular activities as a key part of your application.

Here's something for you all to think about.

Have you ever thought how much your Lions Members are worth to your Community?

My own Lions Club, the Australian Lionsonoz Lions Club, does on average between 800 and 1,000 hours service every month in community service, now let's put that into a dollar value to give you an idea on what that "Lions Member" is worth to your community and to show you just how much money our Lions Club is saving our local councils, state governments and our federal government.

OK, let's do the sums, if we say our club does on average 900 service hours a month, and let's say that work is worth \$50.00 per hour, then that equates to \$45,000 a month, or \$540,000.00 a year. Staggering, isn't it?

This figure does not include the generosity in the money spent by members in doing this work, in fuel, stationery, phone, tools, machinery, trucks or utes and trailers, uniforms etc., and the list goes on, given freely by members.

Now multiply that by the number of Lions right across Australia, then we are talking millions of dollars in savings to our local councils, state governments and our federal government.

We have over 1,300 Lions Clubs in Australia with over 30,000 members, the figure would be astounding when start to think what the dollar amount would be if you were to add up all those service hours performed by Lions in this country, then putting it into a dollar value.

So, the next time you see Lions selling raffle tickets, cooking at a BBQ, selling the Lions Xmas Cakes or doing dirty hands-on work for the community in parks and or helping the elderly in our communities. Stop and Think,

"How much is that Lion worth".

LIONS QUEST: EMPOWERING YOUTH ACROSS THE GLOBE

Over the course of four decades, Lions Quest has made a profound impact on youth, experienced exponential growth and formed meaningful partnerships to help young people reach their full potential.

Lions Quest is Lions Clubs International Foundation's (LCIF) comprehensive and universal, evidence-based social and emotional learning program. This year marks the 40th anniversary of LCIF's first grant to what used to be the independent organization, Quest International.

Over the years, the two organizations grew closer, leading LCIF to purchase the program in 2002. To date, LCIF has awarded more than 360 grants for a cumulative total of more than US\$20 million to expand or establish Lions Quest programs across the United States and around the world. Exponential growth has been the natural result of this investment, with 20 million students reached in 40 languages across 110 countries.

Lions Quest's story began in 1975, when a determined teenager named Rick Little set out on a "quest" to help other young people develop the skills and strength of character needed to succeed as adults. Little started his journey by conducting a survey of more than 2,000 high school students to truly understand the issues that concerned them

most. This initial success prompted expansion into programming for middle school students and the development of Skills for Adolescence, which pioneered a social and emotional learning program for young people before it was a trend.

With the same spirit of innovation, Lions Quest has undertaken a full-scale revision of the curriculum, training and supplemental content. "Youth today are not like youth 10 to 15 years ago," said Alvin Atkinson of the Winston-Salem Twin City Host Lions Club. "Fortunately, because Lions Quest is evidence-based, it sees what works and what doesn't and evolves as technology and our lives evolve."

In the new curriculum, materials are being revised to be more dynamic and student-centered, while also being shorter and more streamlined. The goal is to make the lessons easier to use and more effective. Each curated resource works seamlessly to help children and young adults acquire and effectively apply the knowledge and skills necessary to understand and manage emotions, set and achieve goals, feel and show empathy for others, establish positive relationships and make responsible decisions.

"I think the social and emotional learning pieces of the Lions Quest program are critical," said Chip Harris, trainer at Lions Quest. "They were critical when I started my career over 40 years ago, and they're equally, maybe more important today, largely because social and emotional learning brings people together, and allows them to be able to respect and appreciate each other."

Over the past 40 years, Lions Quest has shaped social and emotional learning for millions of young people around the world. As the program evolves, it will continue offering students curriculum and resources to build the skills needed to navigate life and prevent bullying and substance abuse. This proactive evolution will propel Lions Quest's legacy of innovation into the next decade.

Whilst technology can be a great tool for all of us, it is important to be aware of the many scams that can be found online. These emails are indiscriminate and are becoming increasingly clever and sophisticated. We've collated some tips and tricks to keep yourself safe online and help you identify some of the common scams.

Online Safety Tips

- Protect your computer by purchasing and installing a good quality malware/virus protection program.
- Use complex passwords to make it difficult for hackers to guess. Make sure you don't use the same password for everything, instead write them down on a piece of paper and keep it somewhere safe. Alternatively, use a reputable password manager application. Some tips on creating a strong password can be found here: <https://www.cyber.gov.au/protect-yourself/securing-your-accounts/passphrases>
- Never provide personal information via email (address, passwords, date of birth, etc.). With hacking being so prevalent, it's impossible to know where this information could end up. If you receive an email requesting these details and it is a business/someone that you know, give them a call and provide the information over the phone, instead. If you don't recognise the sender, delete the email immediately.
- Do not open any attachments or links unless you know who is sending it and you are expecting it. This is one of the most common ways that viruses can infect your computer. Hackers are very clever and can replicate email addresses, meaning that a virus may be enclosed in an attachment that looks like it is coming from a family member. Consider every link in an e-mail as potentially risky. For example, if you receive an e-mail from your bank asking you to click a link, go to your bank website instead, and find that link.
- Be alert to unusual e-mails. Think about what you know about the sender, is the e-mail unusual or unexpected? If you're unsure about it, don't reply. Give them a call or open 'new message' and send an email to the sender using a known email address.
- Do not pay any bills that you cannot independently verify as legitimate, or if you don't remember receiving the service. Do not email/phone the provider using the information provided in the suspect email, as it may be fake. Instead, find the correct contact details online to verify the bill.
- Never make bank transfers, particularly for large amounts, based on account numbers and BSB numbers sent by e-mail. E-mails can be forged. Always verify the account details over the phone.
- Learn to check e-mail addresses for hidden code. Remember the name you read may not be the destination of the e-mail.
- If you get an e-mail from someone you know requesting money, ring the sender, or their friends and family, to independently verify their status before sending any money.



Common Scams

- **Attempts to gain your personal information**
 - Scammers are clever and use sneaky tactics, such as hacking or phishing, to get your personal details which they can then use to commit fraudulent activities or identity theft.
- **Dating and Romance**
 - Scammers create a fake online dating profile and convince vulnerable people to send them money.
- **Remote access scams**
 - Scammers will pose as IT specialists and convince you that there's an error with your computer. They will attempt to gain remote access to your computer in order to "fix the problem" and steal your credit card details. Never give an unsolicited caller remote access to your device.
- **Unexpected prize and lottery scams**
 - If you receive an email or text advising you you've won a large amount of money that sounds too good to be true, it almost certainly is. Scammers attempt to convince you to give them money or personal information in order to receive a prize that doesn't exist.
- **Sick friend scam**
 - Scammers pose as a sick friend of yours and send you an email requesting financial assistance.
- **Missed Delivery scam**
 - Scammers contact you via text/email advising you that you've missed a delivery. They will ask you to click on a link to organize an alternate delivery time. Clicking on this link will download malicious software to your phone.
- **False billing**
 - You receive an email with a bill that looks legitimate. The account will have false payment details or are for services that you have not received.

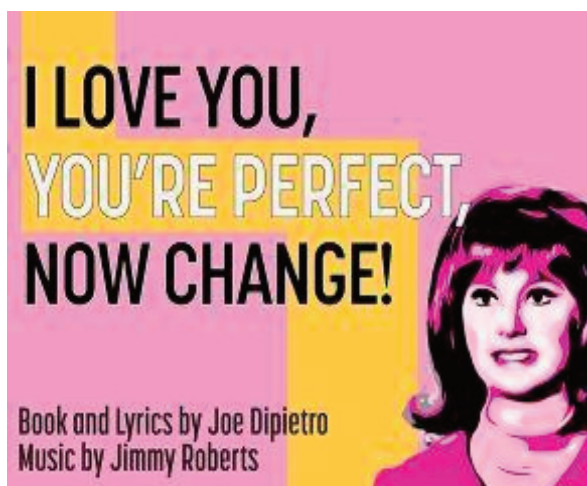

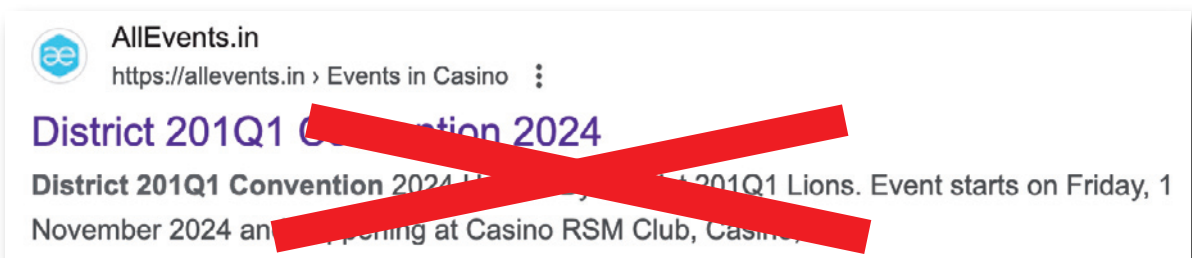

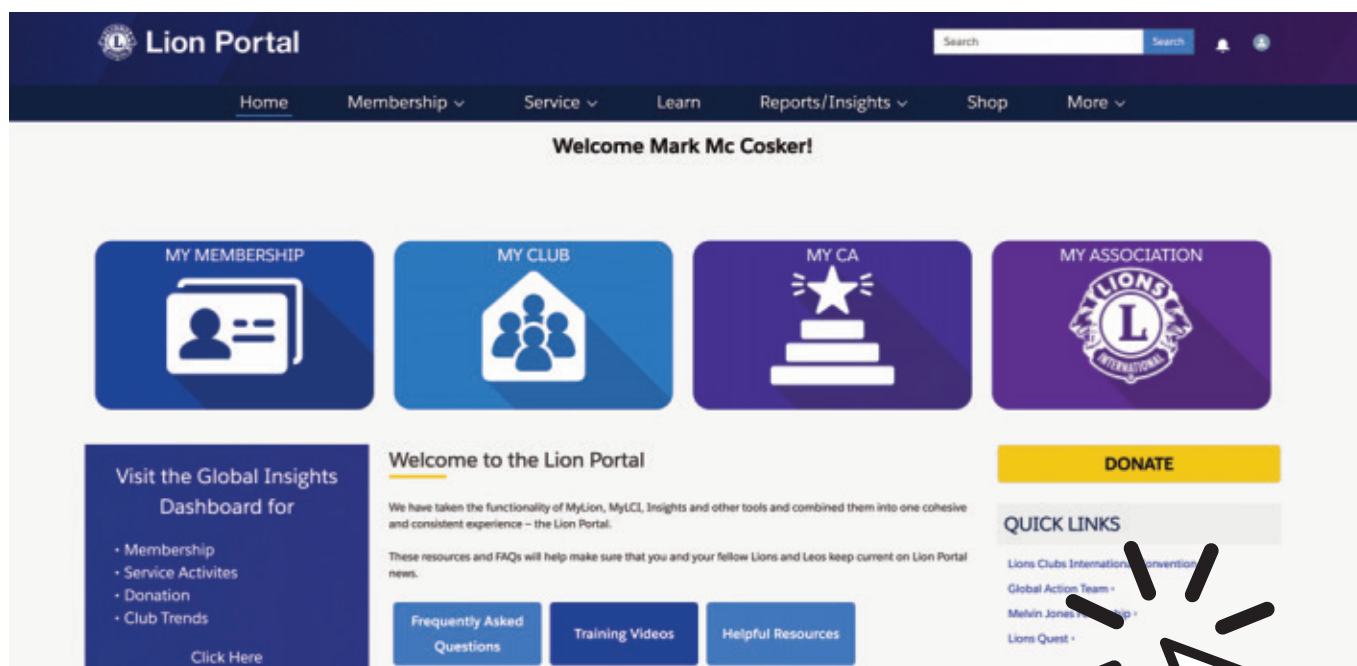
